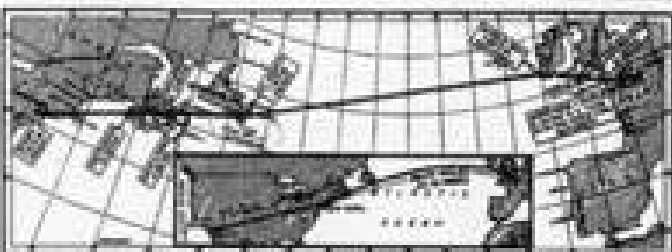

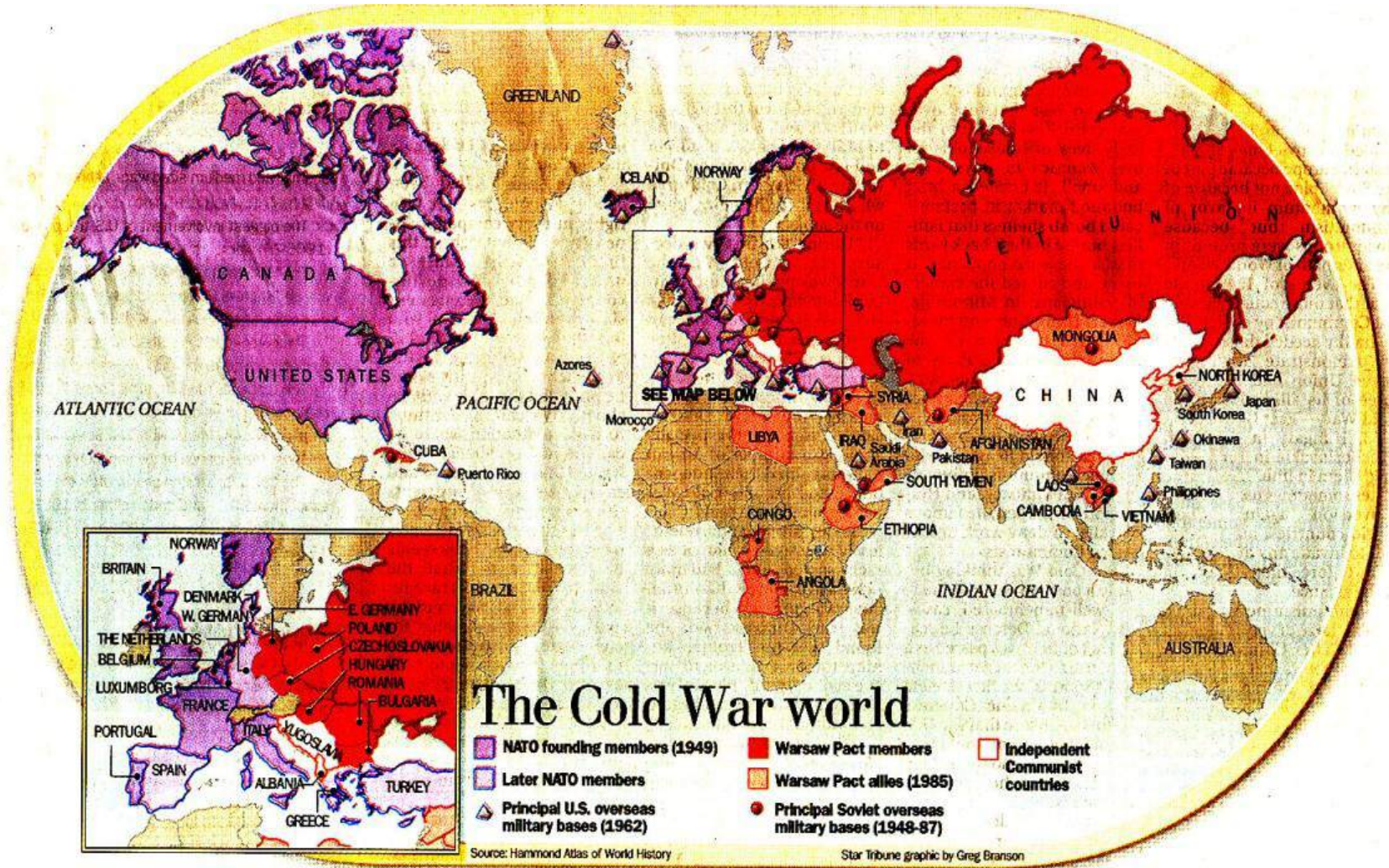
The U.S. wins World War II but so does the Soviet Union.

We have a good economy, and most American women are able to stay at home to work and be with their children.

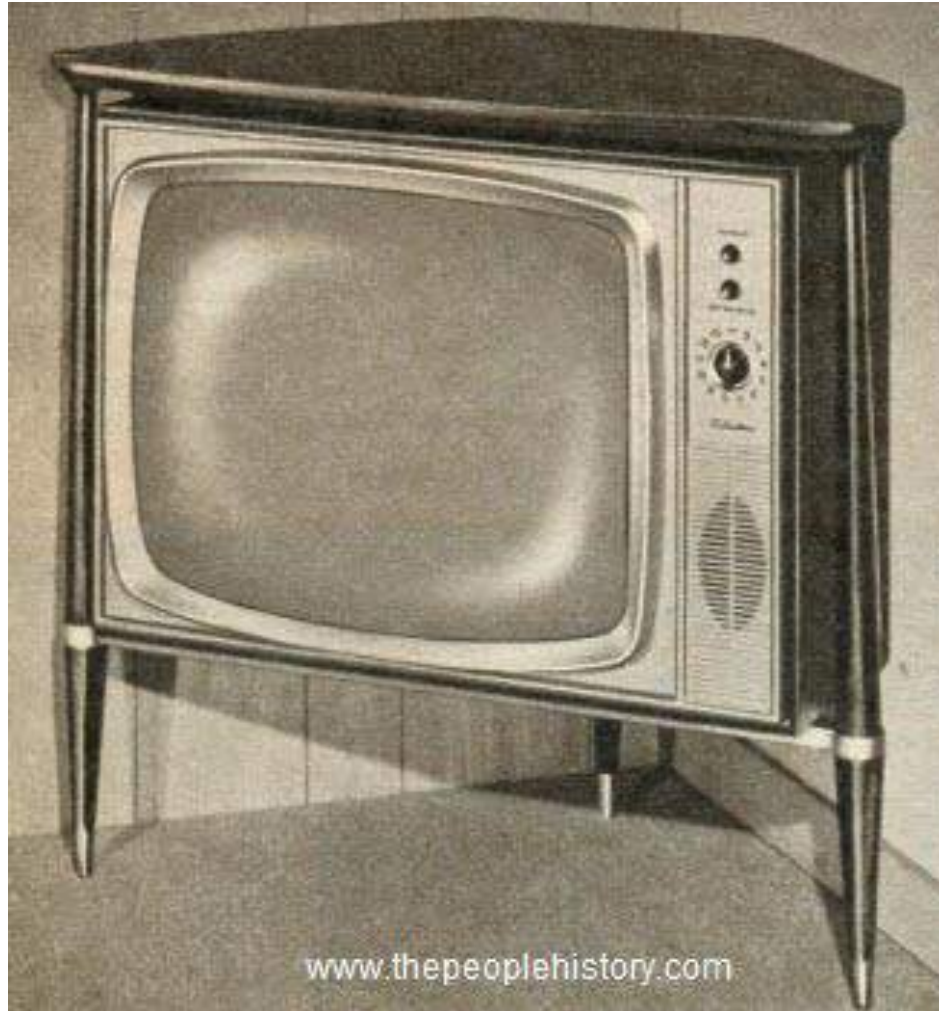

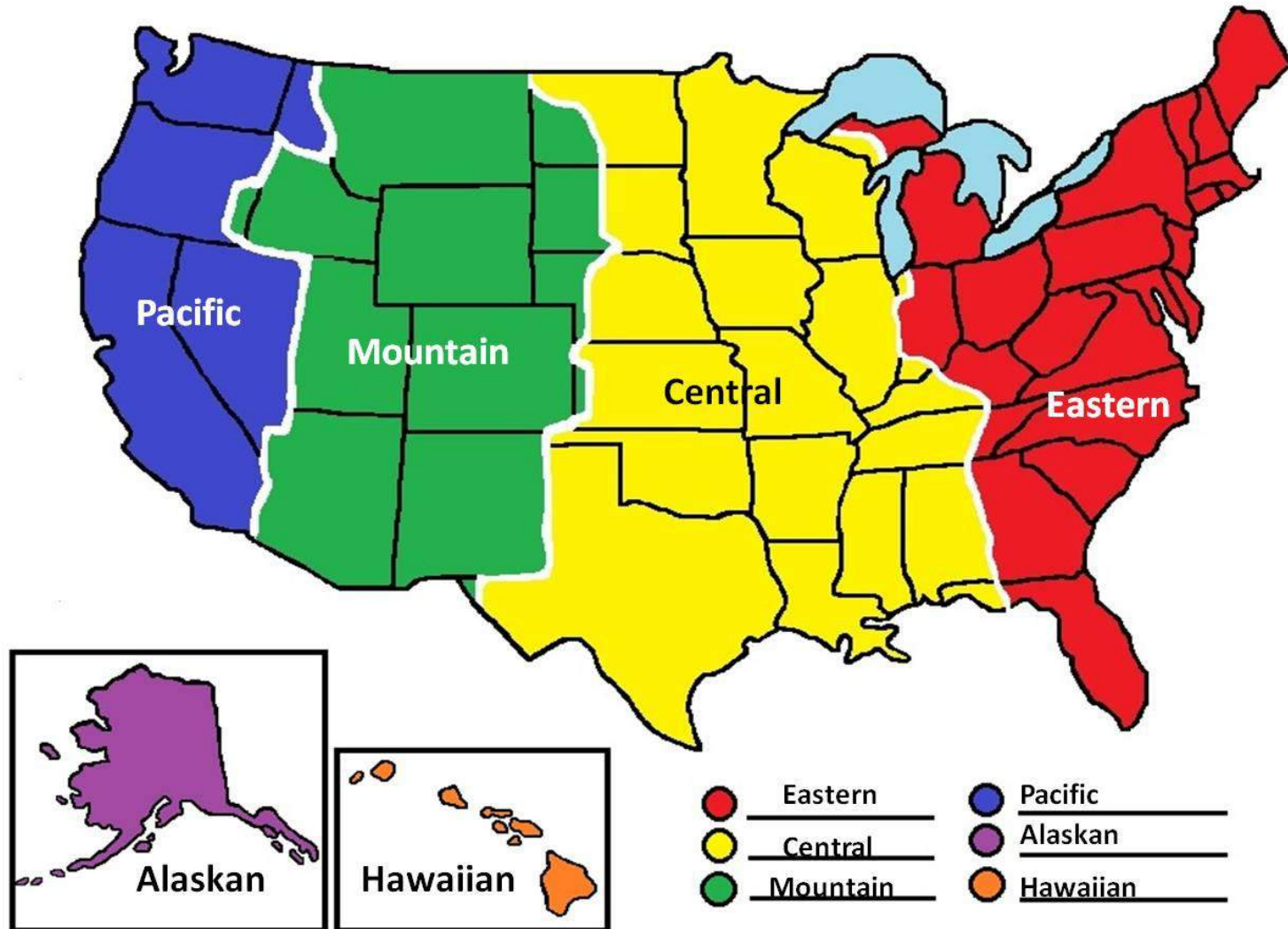
There were three networks and channels that people could watch.

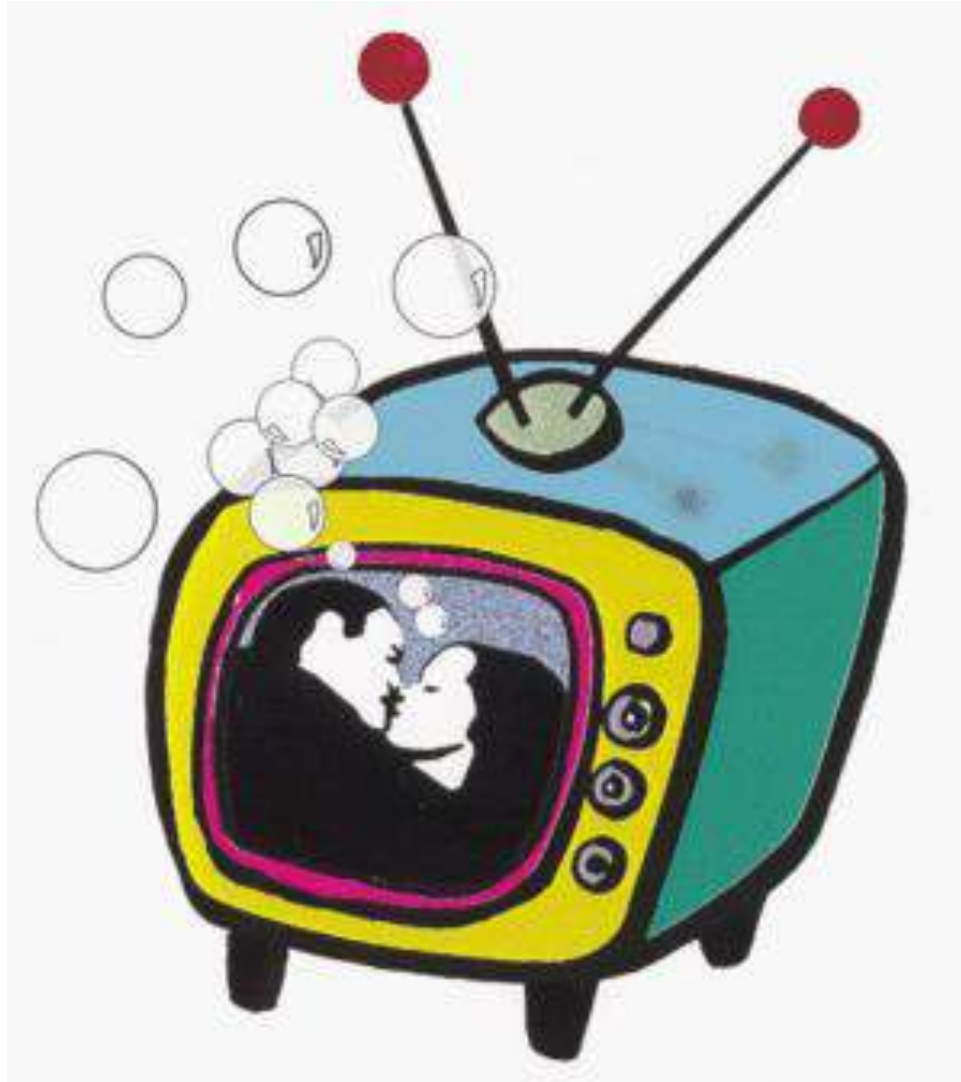
1960s

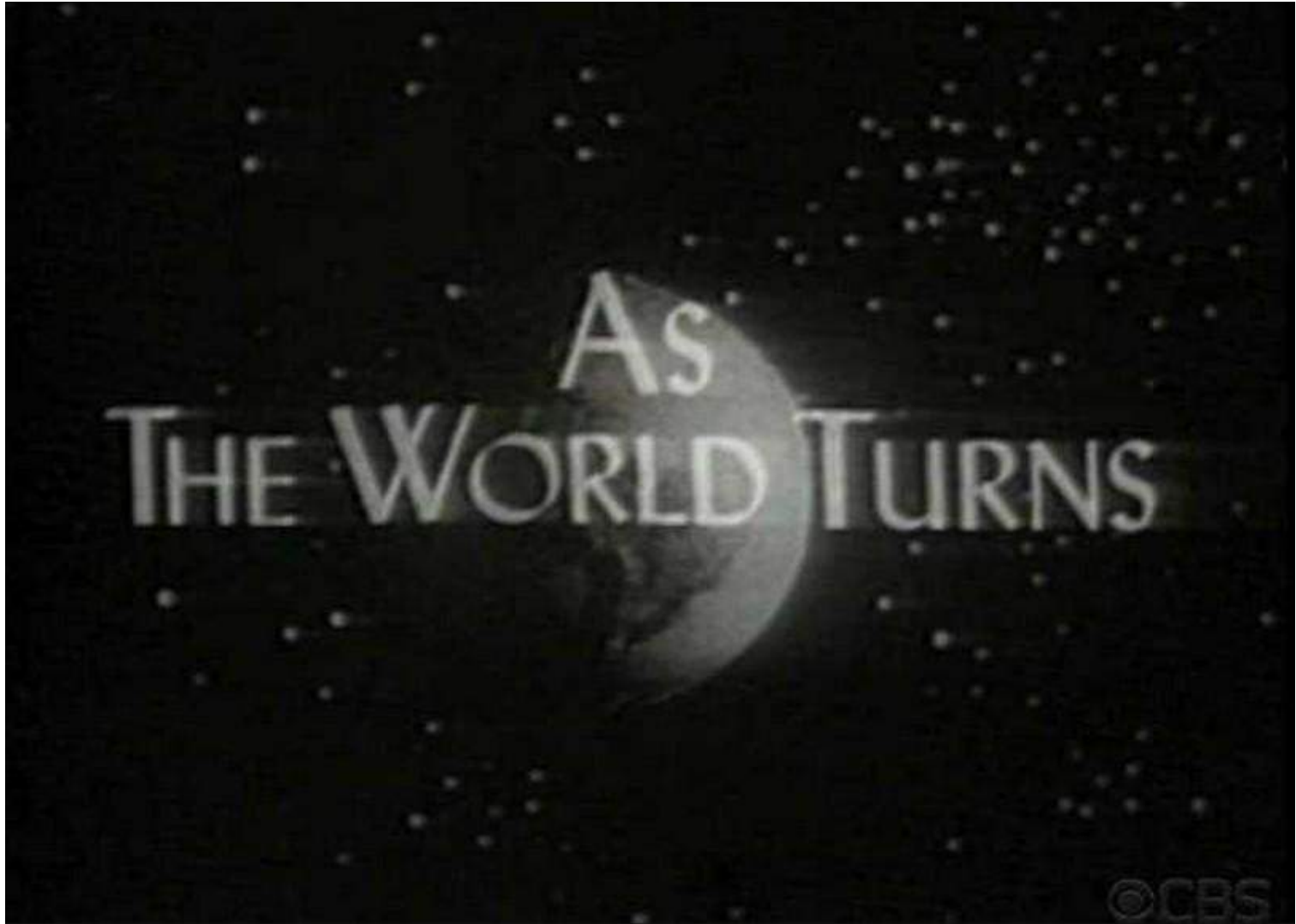
Go to the small desk near the map of the world and pick up a packet on Soap Operas and a blank sheet of paper.
