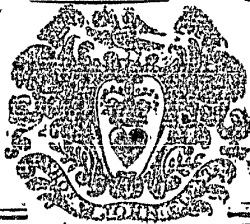

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Yesterday, towards Evening a great Number of People unlawfully and riotously assembled themselves together, in the Town of Boston, armed with Clubs, Staves, &c. and with great Noise and Tumult, pulled down a new-erected Building belonging to the Secretary of the Province, and having so done surrounded his Dwelling-House, pulled down Part of his Fences, broke his Windows; at length with Force and Violence entered the House and damaged and destroyed his Furniture, and continued thus unlawfully assembled until Midnight, and committed divers other Outrages and Enormities to the great Terror of his Majesty's liege Subjects:

I Have therefore thought fit with the Advice of His Majesty's Council to issue this Proclamation, requiring all Justices of Peace, and all Officers civil and military, to use their utmost Endeavours for discovering, apprehending and bringing to Justice all and every of the Persons concerned in the unlawful Assembly aforesaid.

And I do hereby promise, that whosoever shall discover and detect any of the Persons concerned in the Outrages aforesaid, so that they or any of them may be lawfully convicted, shall receive out of the Publick Treasury of this Province, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS as a Reward, to be paid upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders: And any Person concerned therein ever and above the Reward aforesaid; upon Discovery of any of his Accomplices as aforesaid, shall receive his Majesty's free and gracious Pardon.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS towards Evening on the 26th Day of August Instant, a great Number of People unlawfully and riotously assembled themselves together in the Town of Boston, armed with Clubs, Staves, &c. and with great Noise and Tumult did first of all attack the Dwelling-House of *William Story, Esq;* Deputy-Register of the Court of Admiralty within this Province, break his Windows, and with Force and Violence enter his said House, and the Office wherein the Books and Files belonging to the said Court were lodged, and did scatter, burn or destroy the same, and most of his own Papers, and Papers belonging to other Persons then in his Custody, and did damage and destroy a great Part of his Furniture. After which the said riotous People or other Rioters, did proceed to the Dwelling-House of *Benjamin Hollowell, Esq;* Comptroller of his Majesty's Customs for the Port of Boston, break down the Fence before it, break his Windows and at length with Force and Violence enter the said House, damage and destroy the Waincoat and Furniture of the same, drink and destroy the Liquors in his Cellars, take away his Wearing-Apparel, break open his Desk and Trunks, and take out all his Papers, and about Thirty Round Sterling in Money.

AND WHEREAS these or other riotous People did on the same Night attack the Dwelling-House of the Honorable *Thomas Hutchinson, Esq;* Lieutenant-Governor of the said Province, and forcibly enter the same, break down and destroy the Waincoat and Partitions therein, leaving the Hou: a mere Shell from Top to Bottom, break and destroy every Window of the said House with all the Furniture belonging thereto, destroy or carry off all the Wearing-Apparel, Jewels, Books and Papers of every Kind belonging to his Honour and his Family, drink, take away or destroy eight Pipes and three Quarter-Casks of Wine, and every Bottle of Liquors and all Provisions and Stores of what Kind soever in his Cellars, and carry off about Nine Hundred Pounds Sterling in Money, together with all his Honor's Plate, pillaging and destroying every Thing in the said House of what Kind soever; and did afterwards deliberately cut down the Cupola or Lantern on Top of the House, and uncover great Part of the Roof; the said People continuing thus riotously and tumultuously assembled the whole Night and until Day-light the next Morning, committing divers Outrages and Enormities, and threatening the Custom-House, and the Houses of divers Persons, to the great Terror of his Majesty's liege Subjects.

I Have therefore thought fit, with the Advice of His Majesty's Council, to issue this Proclamation, requiring all Justices of Peace, and all Officers, civil and military, to use their utmost Endeavours for discovering, apprehending and bringing to Justice, all and every the Persons concerned in the unlawful Proceedings aforesaid; and also requiring them to use their utmost Endeavours for preventing all such tumultuous Assemblies and Outrages for the future.

AND I do hereby promise a Reward of **THREE HUNDRED POUNDS** for the Discovery of the Leader or Leaders, Director or Directors of any of the Parties aforesaid, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted, and a Reward of **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** for the Discovery of any other Person of such Parties, or of any Person aiding, assisting or advising to any of the Outrages aforesaid, and any Person concerned in any of the riotous Proceedings aforesaid (such principal Leaders or Directors only excepted) shall over and above the Reward aforesaid, upon Discovery of any of his Accomplices receive his Majesty's free and gracious Pardon.

Boston, September 2.

At a Meeting of the Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the Town of Boston, on Tuesday the 27th of August 1765.

THE Town having an utter Detestation of the extraordinary and violent Proceedings of a Number of Persons unknown, against some of the Inhabitants of the same the last Night:

VOTED UNANIMOUSLY, That the Selectmen and Magistrates of this Town be desired to use their utmost Endeavours, agreeable to Law, to suppress the like Disorders for the future, and that the Freeholders and other Inhabitants will do every Thing in their Power to assist them therein.

Altho' not above two Hours Notice was given, there was as well a Meeting at Faneuil-Hall as has been ever known.

In Consequence of the above Resolve the Selectmen, Magistrates, and other Gentlemen of the Town, together with the Cadet Company, several Companies of the Militia, and the Company of the Train of Artillery, have kept Night Watch, to prevent any such further Proceedings.

At a Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, Aug. 28. 1765.

Voted unanimously, THAT this Town has the utmost Detestation and Abhorrence of the Outrages committed at Boston on Monday Evening last, in the violent Assault then made, on the Dwelling-Houses of sundry of the Inhabitants there, by a riotous Assembly of Persons unknown.

And whereas there is Reason to fear the like Disorders may be committed in this Town, Voted, That the Magistrates and Selectmen of the Town be, and they hereby are; desired to use their utmost Endeavours to prevent the same.

Voted unanimously, That the Inhabitants of this Town will by all lawful Ways and Means be aiding and assisting to the Magistrates; military Officers, & Selectmen of the Town, in preventing & suppressing any such riotous Disorders; and will, to the utmost of their Power, oppose any Attempts that may be made against the Persons or Property of any of the Inhabitants of the Town.

An Account of the extraordinary Proceedings in this Town on Monday Night last being included in His Excellency's Proclamation, prevents our giving any Particular.

One Robinson was taken up on Tuesday Night, and committed to Goal, on Suspicion of his having stole some Articles which he had in a Bundle; & on Wednesday he was tried & found guilty of stealing some Cloaths out of a Shop in this Town, and several Things from Persons at Charlestown, and was sentenced to be whipped for the same.

It is hoped that the Goldsmiths, and other Persons to whom Plate may be offered for Sale, will be at this Time exceeding careful of whom they purchase. The Superior Court of Judicature, Court of Assize, and General Goal Delivery, opened on Tuesday Morning; and was adjourned to the 15th of October. Imported from LONDON. From a London Print of the 25th of June last.

LETTERS from Lisbon inform us, that a royal ordinance was put on the point of being published, abolishing the *Auto de Fe*, or court of inquisition, and establishing a milder ecclesiastical court instead of it.

On Saturday Mr. Pitt had a long conference with his Majesty at the Queen's palace.

We hear a grand council is summoned to meet at St. James's on Wednesday next,—when it is said the alteration in the Ministry will be finally settled.

It is assured that no less than 42 changes will soon take place in departments of consequence to the public, among which we hear from good authority, the following are already fixed.

President of the Council, Duke of Newcastle.
Secretaries of State, Duke of Grafton & Mr. Pitt.
First Lord of the Treasury, Earl Temple.
Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. George Grenville.
Secretary of War, Sir George Saville.
Lord Lieut. of Ireland, Marquis of Rockingham.
Master of the Horse, Duke of Portland.
Charles Townsend, Esq; to continue Paymaster of the Forces.

The price of Oatmeal has fell at the court end of the town, 2s. in the bushel, since a late noted change.

It is reported that a patent is preparing for creating Sir Charles Pratt a peer, and that he will be appointed Lord High Chancellor.—Also that the Honourable Sir Charles York will be appointed to a high office.

It is added, that George Onslow, Esq; will be made a Lord of the Treasury, and also that a new receiver general of the land tax for London and Middlesex, will be appointed, the receiver of that office for the current year not commencing till after Michaelmas; and it is likewise said, considerable alterations will be made in the admiralty board, and many of these changes are expected to morrow.

On Friday last, the new Sails of his present Majesty were delivered to the great officers of state.

We hear Sir Harry Moore, Bart. is to have the government of New-York, in the room of Gen. Monckton, who succeeds Gen. Guise, as governor of Berwick castle.

WILLMINGTON, June 26.

A few Days ago a fine young Negroe Boy, belonging to the Hon. Benjamin Heron, was bit by a Snake, and died immediately.

Alexander Simpson, late Master of the Viper School of War, (who in the Month of March last killed Lieut. Whiturst in a duel at Brunwick, and for taking of whom a Reward of 50l. was offered by Proclamation) has now appeared, and surrendered himself up to justice; and will take his Trial at the next Superior Court of this District.

Captain Cook, in a Sloop from Maryland for Bermuda, founded at Sea about 10 Days since: The Crew took to their Boat, and were taken up by a Sloop that arrived here last Friday Night from Virginia.

We hear from New-Jersey, that Mr. Core, the Stamp Officer, appointed for that Province, having applied to a Gentleman to hire a House, was refused, unless he would insure the House from being pulled down, or damaged.

Query, Whether it would not be prudent for all the Stamp Officers to insure their Houses, &c. On Tuesday Morning last, was found in the Fields, at the new Powder-House, the dead Body of an old Negro Woman, who had belonged to Mr. Isaac Depyter. The Coroners Inquest, found, that being notoriously addicted to Theft, Drunkenness, and other Vices, she had been long a Nuisance to her Master's Family: and having been out on Monday Evening, was refused Admittance, and died thro' old Age, and want of proper Nourishment.

The same Morning, Tom, a Negro Fellow, belonging to William Bates, went from home, seemingly in good Humour, not having had before, any known Cause, nor shown any Appearance of Displeasure, or Uneasiness, and with his Handkerchief, hang'd himself, in an old House where he was found about 4 Hours after he had been missing; his Knees bent, and his Toss on the Ground. The Jury brought in their Verdict, Self-Murder.

A sorrowful accident happened at Staten Island on Wednesday last, viz. one Mrs. Mercereux at that place, driving a waggon with only two children in it, in going down a small hill, one of the vicious gaw, and the pulling the horses at the same time, tumbled out of the waggon, and one of the wheels going over her breast, killed her on the spot.

Thursday last His Majesty's Ship the Coventry, Ilawke and Garland, arrived from a cruise.

We hear there are several foot-pads dispersed on the road between this city and Philadelphia, for whom the several constables have orders to keep a good look out; and we hope soon to hear of their being apprehended: There are two fellows taken up on suspicion of belonging to this gang, & lodged in the goal: It is said most of them are the precious gifts of our kind mother, who generously lends us those villains that are nuisances to herself.

Capt. Gale from the Bay, on the 14th July spoke Capt. Holmes and Clarkson from Jamaica for Penacola, with 500 troops on board: and on the 19th, he spoke with Capt. Penton from this port, who had lost his shipwreck, and had put into the Havannah for a new one, but was not allowed to remain there two hours, and was bound for Penacola.

Besides a great Number of Papers more, that will be very costly."

We hear from New-London, that about 4 o'clock last Thursday afternoon, was exhibited in the moll public place of the town, the effigies of a Distributor of Stamps, with a Boot on one of the shoulders, and the D— represented as looking out of the same. They were suspended in the air, on a gibbet, 20 and 30 feet from the ground; and after being exposed about an hour, were taken down, and carried thro' the town, attended by the principal part of the inhabitants. The cannon of the Fort were repeatedly discharged during the time of exhibition. Between ten and eleven the effigies were consumed, amidst the acclamations of the people. "Tis said the most perfect decorum was observed in all their behaviour, and no person received the least injury. And we hear from Norwich, in the same Colony, that the inhabitants of that town manifested their detestation of Stamps, Stampmen, &c. in much the same manners as the above, on Wednesday last. On Wednesday last the Maidfords, Capt. Antrobus, sailed for Halifax.

London in 17 days from St. Leger, and informs, that two days before he sail'd, they received advice of a violent gale of wind or hurricane at Guadaloupe, in which 14 fail of large vessels, and sundry small craft were drove ashore, and near all lost.

AN NAPOLIS, in Maryland; Aug. 15. Last week a very melancholy affair happen'd in this place: On Thursday morning Mr. Francis Keys, constable, went out and gathered a parcel of, as he thought, mushrooms, and brought them to Mr. Golder's, his lodgings, where they were fry'd, and Mr. Golder, a little son of his about 3 years old, and Keys, all eat of them about 8 or 9 o'clock in the morning; but in the evening, they were seiz'd with violent vomitings, and purgings. Next morning the flesh of Keys and the child was as cold as lead, except about the stomach, and so they continued, tho' the weather was very hot, till death put a period to both their disorders, on Saturday morning at 8 and 9 o'clock. The surgeons opened the body of Keys, but found his stomach and heart sound, the poison having, we suppose, diffused thro' the whole mass of blood. Golder is yet alive, but has been extreme ill ever since, and whether he will recover or not, God only knows. No person in the family eat of the meat, except Mrs. Golder, who only tasted, and was taken ill, but soon recovered.

Since the above catastrophe happen'd, it has been conjectured, perhaps on very good grounds, that several lives have been lost here and in the vicinity, by the same means. A woman and her daughter, about a twelvemonth ago, were taken ill with disorders not unlike the above, and both died;—

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Newport, Rhode-Island, to one in this Town, Aug. 29. 1765.

My Dear Friend,

"I just took Pen in Hand to inform you, that in following the example of your people, we had gone beyond all bounds; it was interrupted by hearing of the unhappy affair which follow'd in Boston; and therefore desist in pointing out how far the behavior here exceed'd that of your place: However shall give you some account of the proceedings in this Town.

You may know that previous to any thing done in public, there were hints given out that the Effigies of some certain persons were preparing to be exhibited on Tuesday, when there was to be a meeting of the freemen of the town for the choice of Deputies; one of the Gentlemen bearing of it imprudently advertised in the Monday's paper, that he still maintained the opinions published in his Halifax Letter, which made some unangels in the minds of the people; he thereupon with two or three others removed out of town with these effects: On Tuesday about 9 o'clock in the morning the populace brought forth the effigies of three persons in a cart, each of them with a rope about their necks, and carried them to a gallows about 20 feet high, placed near the town-house, on which they were exhibited to public view the whole day, where great numbers of people resorted. The good opinion the chief actors in this affair had imbib'd of your great patriot, induc'd them to extract from his pamphlets several motto's which they thought would best describe the persons and their sentiments to the populace, and are as follows:

On the Stampman, an S painted on his Forehead, and Stampman in Capitals on his Breast.
At his Left Hand, M-t-n H-w-o-d, with an S on his Forehead, and on his Breast, That savaning, insidious, infamous Parricide, Martinus Scriblerus.—His Neck, with that of his Accomplice, connected with a Rope, to which was appended a Paper with this inscription, We have an hereditary, indefeasible Right to an Halter;—besides, we encouraged the Growth of Hemp you know.—In his Right Hand he held his Halifax Letter, and on his Right Arm inscribed, The only shield Fen.—From his Mouth issued this Label, directed to war'n his Left Arm, What avails my boasted independence.—Peffery will curse my Memory.—And on his Left Arm this Sentence, Cur's d Ambition, accur'd Claz: ye have ruin'd us.
On the Right Hand of the Stampman hung, with the Letter S painted on his Forehead, Dr. Murphy, and on his Breast, That formale, misgerated, learing Jacobite, Dr. Murphy. Out of his mouth issued this Label, We cannot complain Martinus, we deserve this, and worse.—In his Right Hand he held a Letter, directed, To that Mawgawgeene of Knowledge, Dr. Murphy, Newport, Rhode Island. And on his Right arm, If I had received this Letter from the Earl of — but a Week sooner. And on his Left arm, It is too late now, Martinus, to tack about, we are all agreed.

On one of the Polls out of Reach, Whoever attempts, in any Way whatsoever, to render insignificant this Mark of public Contempt, will be deem'd an Enemy to Liberty, and incur the Reformation of the Town.—On the other, at the same Height, the following SONG.

IIE who for a Poll, or bafe furdid Pelf, His Country betrays, makes a Rope for himself; Of this an Example before you we bring, In these infamous Rogues, who in Effigy swing, Huzza, my brave Boys!—every Man stand his ground, With Liberty's Praise let the Welkin rebound; Eternal Disgrace on those miscreants fall, Who thro' Pride or for Wealth would turn us all

Let in make with us, as to them let stand strong,
(Your Puffs and your Vapours do never last long)
To maintain our just Rights ev'ry measure pursue,
To our King we'll be loyal—to ourselves we'll be true.

Those Blessings our Fathers obtain'd by their blood,
We are justly oblig'd to their Sons to make good;
All Internal Taxes let us then nobly spurn,
These Effigies first—next the Stamp Paper burn.

Chorus, Sing Tantarara, burn all, burn all,
Sing Tantarara, burn all,
These Effigies having hung till night, they were
then cut down and burnt under the gallows, amidst
the acclamations of the people; which being done,
they returned very orderly to their respective homes.

The next morning the Gentlemen who had retired
out of town, returned with their effects without any
obstruction, until the afternoon, when an inhabitant
of the town who had received a private injury from
the Collector of the customs here, meeting him in the
street with Mr. W—d, he insisted on satisfaction;
whereupon the Collector retired and I got on board
the man of war; and Mr. W—d reproving the person
for his insolence provoked the populace in such a manner,
that when evening came they murder'd and beate
the wife of Martin Howard, jun. Esq; enter'd and
broke and destroyed the goods, furniture, and every
thing therein, leaving only a shell of the house; they
then proceeded to the house of Dr. Thomas Motatt,
where they behaved in the same manner, from whence
they intended for the house of Augustus Johnston, Esq;
who had been appointed Distributor of the Stamp,
but were stop'd and parley'd with by a Gentleman
who inform'd them that the house was not the property
of Mr. Johnston; and being convinced of the
truth thereof, they desisted, upon being told with a
quantity of liquor; but insisted that the Gentlemen
should deliver up Mr. Johnston's effects the next day,
which were then in the house, unless he resigned the
Office he had been appointed to; whereupon on Thurs-
day morning he returned to town, and gave them un-
der his hand that he would not accept of the office with-
out their approbation; which resolution was imme-
diately published thro' the town.

One of the gang, a foreigner, lately transported
from England to America, who had been active, was
taken up and committed to goal; he behaved in a most
insolent manner, declaring himself to be the chief
conductor of these last riotous proceedings.

Thus I have given you a short account of the dis-
orders here; what will be the event of them, and
the conduct of the people in several other places, God only
knows.
Yours, &c."

We hear from Providence, that some of the Peo-
ple there (struck with the patriotic Behaviour of
their Brethren at Newport, at this important Crisis,
when American Liberty is thought to be in Danger)
suspended the Effigy of the Rhode Island Stamp-
man over the Great Bridge there on Thursday Night
last, which hung all the next Day, and in the Evening
was cut down and burnt by the Populace.

We have a Report from Virginia, that upon the
arrival of the Stamp-Master there, the Gentlemen
of the Place invited him to a Ball at Night, and
treated him with the utmost Politeness, but after it
was over they informed him his Baggage was put
on board another Vessel which was to sail for Lon-
don the next morning, and advised him to take Pas-
sage in her without Delay, as his Life would be in
Danger if he staid there another Day; this advice
was immediately complied with and went off immediately.

We have various reports concerning the Stamp-
men, at Connecticut, some say he has fled the Go-
vernment, others that he has actually resign'd that
invidious Employment, but he might to conceal him-
self for the present to avoid the Reformation of the
People.

We hear the Friends of the Stamp-man for New-
Hampshire, in order to quiet the minds of the Peo-
ple there, and prevent their manifesting any marks
of public Disgrace to him, have engaged that he
will resign that Office upon his arrival there; other-
wise they will then leave him to the Consequences
of the popular Reformation.

We hear the New-York Stamp-Master, has by
the advice of his Friends, resigned that odious Office.
Several Persons were last Week taken up and
committed to Goal for being aiding and assisting in
the Outrages committed in this Town on Mon-
day Night last; and 'tis said some further Discove-
ries will soon be made of the principal Leaders and
Directors in the shocking Transactions of that Night.

nies, among whom was Capt. Eluathun Jones, in a
