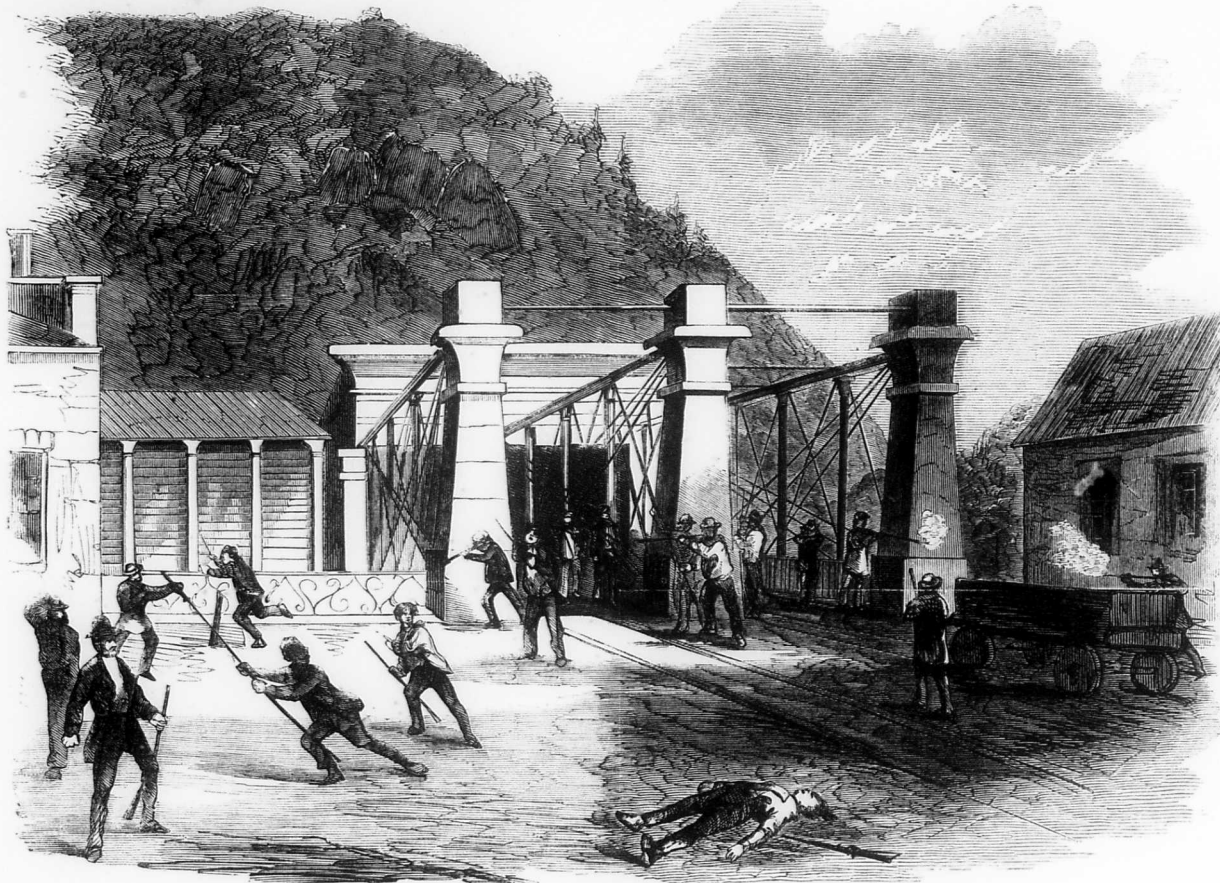

Wise's Interview with Brown.

The interview between the Governor and the prisoner Brown was very interesting. Very little information was obtained from the wounded man. Upon Wise advising him to prepare for death, he

retorted by saying that no amount of repentance could do away with the evils Wise had sanctioned and committed. It was evident that the miserable man considered himself as an instrument in the hands of Providence, and that, while he lamented the death of his sons, he considered they had fallen in a glorious cause, and one which he himself was ready to perish for. The Governor bore his remarks with true Virginian courtesy, and

with a sort of half-concealed regret that so much earnestness had been wasted in so bad a cause.
