It is prepared entirely from the olds of the city of Patna.

Mr. Lat Rous of the academy of Rouen informed me, that the following receipt had been found to andwer very well in many parts of France for the manufactory of this falt. It is taken from Glauber, a German chemitt. I fhall deliver it in his own woods.
